First Nations Diorama Project

In this project, we will make an inquiry/discovery in to the personal heritage of our First Nations - the original inhabitants of Canada. We will visually represent their environment and show how they existed *with* nature on a subsistence system; this is contrasted with the exploitation/profit system that the Euro Canadians used when exploring and "conquering" Canada.



What is Required:

This is a two part assignment:



PART ONE: DIORAMA

- A visual representation of GSCHF, or Geography, Society, Clothing, Housing, Food from one of the five first Nations peoples (Inuit, Northwest Coast, Plateau, Plains, Woodlands/Iroquois).
- You are to create a diorama or 3D "scene" from the people you choose and include elements/objects of GSCHF.
- A map of the area on the outside is required. On the inside, cut outs from magazines or printed scenes or hand drawn scenes helps to show where they lived.

PART TWO: VENN DIAGRAM

- A written/graphical representation of your First Nations people, comparing past conditions as opposed to what your situation/our society is like today.
- This will be done in a **Venn Diagram** format which shows similarities in the middle and differences on the outside of two overlapping circles. This is an effective way to compare and contrast the past with the present and hopefully see what has happened in four hundred years since Canada was first explored by Europeans.

I have tried to provide some materials but you will ultimately have to come up with some; the thrift store or Dollar store may have very cheap stuff to use, and craft stores have some reasonable supplies as well.

You will also be completing a project checklist and self-reflection questions once you have finished both parts of this assignment. Images of your project will be uploaded to your ePortfolio, where you will write your answers to your reflection questions as well.

Step 1

Pick Group & Complete Diorama Planning Sheet (Notes)

- Decide which First Nations group you want to focus on. See me to sign up.
- Use your textbook and online resources to find the information required for you to complete your diorama and Venn Diagram.
- •Think about and write down how you are going to represent what you have learned, and which materials you can use.

Step 2

Complete Diorama

• Make sure you use the checklist included to ensure that you have all the required elements.

Step 3

Complete Venn Diagram

• Make sure you use the checklist included to ensure that you have all the required elements.

Step 4

Self-Assessment

• Complete the self-assessment checklist and comments.

Step 5

Add to ePortfolio + Reflection

- Add images of your Diorama and Venn Diagram to your "Indigenous Peoples" page of your ePortfolio
- Complete the reflection questions on your ePortfolio page underneath your project.

You will be given quite a few blocks of class time to work on this project, with some access to the computers. If you use your time wisely you should be able to finish it during class time. I am hoping this will be a fun, hands on experience where content and creativity combine to show the "then" and the "now". If you have any questions or concerns please talk to me!
