### <u>Overview</u>

Welcome to Social Studies 11! As a required course for graduation, Social Studies 11 marks the culmination of students' social studies education. Building upon the foundation of knowledge, skills, and attitudes students have gained in social studies from Kindergarten to Grade 10, it offers students an integrated approach to Canadian and global issues. Social Studies 11 is also a foundation course for further study in the humanities and social sciences.

With its focus on historical and contemporary social, cultural, political, legal, economic, and environmental issues, Social Studies 11 contributes to the important goal of preparing students for their future lives as Canadian citizens and members of the international community. The curriculum is designed to engage students in critical, reflective inquiry into the challenges facing Canadians at the beginning of the 21st century. Through this type of inquiry, students develop personal responses to these challenges. They learn to base their responses on informed analysis of evidence, on an understanding of their responsibilities and values, and on a realization of the consequences of their choices on themselves and others.

By exploring a variety of perspectives in a thorough and balanced manner, students experience ways of approaching persistent problems, questions, and issues with confidence and purpose.

### <u>Assessment</u>

Assessment methods in this course will be varied, including self, peer and teacher evaluations in both a formative and summative format. Students will be expected to contribute to <u>both</u> their own learning <u>and</u> that of their peers. This belief requires the students to be engaged in a respectful discourse that places a premium on the common goal of greater understanding and skill development.

\* Essay (Multi-Paragraph Writing) will be tested on each *Unit Test* but the mark will "roll" forward provided that improvement continues throughout the year. Thus, the student's earlier attempts will *not* count against them as they continue to improve.

Practice = Practice assignments, in-class activities, peer & self assessments, short quizzes
Knowledge= Assignments that demonstrate factual understanding (tests with multiple choice, true/false, etc.)
Research= Both individual and group projects

**Communication**= Effective written, visual and oral communication (discussions, debates, presentations) **Essay**= Development of multi-paragraph responses, primarily on unit tests

**Social Responsibility**= a social standard that means that we will help people in need; we will be doing various studies and assignments based on this idea.

# **Class Procedures**

#### Leaving Class

Please check with the teacher <u>before</u> leaving the classroom. Any student leaving the classroom **must have** the **hall pass** with them.

#### **Cell Phones**
